Mike made a motion to approve the consent agenda as presented, Jack seconded the motion, Motion carried.

<u>PUBLIC COMMENT</u>: No public in attendance. Kristin read aloud an email from Raymond Stutz, a Twanoh Heights customer. Mr. Stutz commended the PUD for their decision to move their water rates into a uniformed rate structure and for tackling water projects on a PUD-wide basis to assist all customers.

BUSINESS AGENDA:

Viewcrest Beach Customer Request for Discussion on System Development Fee (Tim Carroll)

Mr. Carroll attended this meeting by phone. He explained to Staff and the Board that he had purchased four new lots in the Viewcrest Beach area. He was asking to have the System Development Fee's waived. After discussion it was decided that Mr. Carroll will work with staff on options to avoid a second metered service on his neighboring lot and if that's not possible, this item will be moved to the May 26, 2020 board meeting for consideration.

Approval of Twanoh Consolidation Water System Plan – Kristin reported to the commission that staff sent out notice to customers in March regarding the intent to move the consolidation plan forward. Following questions from a customer on one of those systems, staff sent out another executive summary with more details. One customer from Twanoh Terrace sent a lengthy email with several questions seeking clarification on the costs. Kristin spoke with him for a long time, clarifying that the rate increase is tied to the COSA and the consolidation has no effect on the rates. It was prioritized for the capital budget. Kristin said she would ask the commission to consider moving the approval of the cosnolidation plan to the next agenda to allow more questions from customers. No other customers have contacted the PUD or called into the meeting, with the exception of the email from Mr. Stutz. Commissioner discussion ensued. Mike and Jack stated that they both were ready to approve the plan today because they knew it was the right decision for the PUD's water customers. The board ultimately agreed to move the item to the May 26th meeting to see if anyone else wanted to provide comment.

Resolution 2036 – Designation of Applicant's Agent (FEMA COVID-19 Funding) – Mike made a motion to approve Resolution 2036 Designation of Applicant's Agent (FEMA Covid-19 Funding); Jack seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Award Contract for Manzanita to 106 Double Circuit Project to Hanson Excavation – Mike made a motion to Award the Contract for Manzanita to 106 Double Circuit Project to Hanson Excavation in the amount of \$474,687.50. Jack seconded the motion. Motion carried. This amount does not include materials. The bid came in under budget and under the engineers estimate. Hanson Excavation is a Mason County contractor and local subcontractors are being used as well.

General Manager - Kristin reported that she is planning to bring everyone back to work the first Monday of June except for a couple employees who will continue to work from home for the next 4-6 weeks. This should coincide with the state's transition to Phase 2 reopening. There will be some minor renovations in the front office to allow safe distancing from customers, but the biggest need is to secure supplies for everyone to be at work. FR masks have been ordered for the Electric crew and should arrive within the week but we also need masks for the other employees and public areas, sanitation supplies and paper products to be able to reopen. Crews will be working in offset shifts to maintain distancing. The PUD will continue to encourage customers to pay over the phone or online, rather than coming into the office. The new business model isn't very personal, but it has actually been pretty effective with no drop off in service. Kristin reported that she has attended the Clean Energy Transformation Act rule making meetings online with WPUDA. She reported that PUD 1 was invited to submit a full proposal from the BPA Environmental Foundation for the electric vehicle car charging stations for the Skokomish Tribe. Jefferson County reached out to neighboring utilities regarding a group cost-share fiber lease along Highway 101 from BPA. The cost would be \$20,000 per year. Kristin has declined it at this time because our grid cannot use it and we aren't wholesale providers. It appears that PUD 3 and Jefferson PUD anticipated this and will likely each go to the Mason/Jefferson county line anyway with their wholesale service. PUD 1 supports this as it will help advance broadband deployment along the canal for our communities.

Director of Operations – Darin reported that the crew has put in two miles of underground in the past two months and is now working on getting it cut over. The smaller crew is working on their summer

brushing list. Darin reported that the water crew have been working on well houses and automatic chlorinators. The water department has two employees that are currently working full time from home so Darin has been having virtual staff meetings every Monday morning and checks in with them daily. Darin reported that in the rotating week, there are two operators that are taking a PUD vehicle home and doing jobs that can be done independently. They have been doing safety meetings practicing social distancing. There have been no accidents or near misses.

Treasurer – Katie reported that she is continuing to monitor the PUD's cash flow. There were about 100 more customers on the disconnect list this month, compared to last month. She reported that Shiane did a great job working through the list, contacting customers to make a payment or payment arrangements. Bill inserts will be going out this month, lettings customers know that a 6-month payment arrangements will be offered for those that have a past due balance. The next step will be analyzing the deposit list and applying deposits to customers' accounts that have had a good payment history within the last six months. Katie also reported that the administrative staff are taking part in weekly NWPPA safety videos and/or NISC training from home on their off weeks.

Legal Counsel – No report.

Correspondence: Included in correspondence was the news release from the *Shelton-Mason County Journal* regarding PUD 1's revenue shortfall due to the COVID19 pandemic, as well as an article regarding the PUD's NWPPA safely award. Also included was an article and video from APPA's website where Kristin was interviewed regarding the pandemic.

Executive Summary for Twanoh Water System Consolidation

BACKGROUND-

Mason County Public Utility District No. 1 received a grant from the Washington State Department of Health to complete planning and pre-design activities for the consolidation of the Twanoh Heights and Twanoh Terrace Water Systems. In a previous version of the consolidated plan, there was a financial implication for customers on those water systems if the PUD moved forward to complete the consolidation activities. The staff and commission decided against moving forward due to many members on those systems being opposed to a capital surcharge for the consolidation activities.

WHY WE ARE MOVING IT FORWARD-

Consolidated Finances- Since January 2020, the rate schedule across all of Mason County PUD 1's water customers are uniformed, just like our power business. There are no direct costs for customers on any particular system associated with improvements or repairs. If these things need done, the PUD plans and budgets for them in order of priority and we also solicit grant funds to help in paying for capital projects.

Planning Efficiency- By creating a single water system, capital improvement projects, water treatment, water quality reports and emergency source locations are also consolidated. Department of Health has given priority to water system that undergo a consolidation, which would make the Twanoh consolidation projects eligible for grant and loan funding packages.

Cost & Reliability Savings to the PUD Water Customers- Only a single water system plan will need to be routinely submitted to the state rather than two (a savings of roughly \$35,000 every 10 years), as well as savings in labor and treatment of two separate water systems. This consolidation also provides significant reliability improvements for all Twanoh customers. With both systems acting as one, water pressure will be maintained by both systems' wells in the water mains. In the event Twanoh Terrace or Twanoh Heights wells were to fail, the system would continue providing water through the redundant sources.

SCHEDULE OF CONSOLIDATION TASKS-

- 1. **Decommission Twanoh Heights Well #2-** Well #2 was damaged in an earthquake in 2001 and has produced little water since the District's attempts to fix it. Since 2001, Well #1 has been the primary source of water production for Twanoh Heights. If it fails, there is no back up source until the Well #1 is fixed or a new well is drilled. (*Will apply for grant funds in the fall of 2020, will target construction for 2022 if funded.*)
- 2. Intertie Water Main- Approximately 500 feet of 4-inch water main will tie the Twanoh Terrace and the Twanoh Heights water systems together. Water main will be extended from the intersection of East Kingsley Drive and East Seahawks Way to the reservoir and booster pump station site. The water main on Kingsley Drive will be upsized in this process. (*Will apply for grant funds in the fall of 2020, will target construction for 2022 if funded.*)
- 3. **Rehabilitate Booster Station-** Rebuild the existing booster pump station to enclose all pumping and control facilities. (*Will apply for grant funds in the fall of 2020, will target construction for 2022 if funded.*)
- 4. **Reservoir #2-** Within the next 20 years, the District intends to construct a second reservoir near the existing reservoir. (*Will apply for grant funds in future years and prioritize in the 10-year construction work plan.*)

COST OF CONSOLIDATION-

The total cost of capital improvement projects, as listed above, as well as non-capital improvements (conservation program, wellhead protection and water system plans), will cost approximately \$415,500. The District plans to apply for construction grants and loans from Department of Health as part of their effort to consolidate smaller systems. We also intend to fund a portion of these projects with the PUD's annual capital improvement plan budget. If grant money or loan forgiveness is not offered to the PUD, then we will conduct the work in stages, as budget allows.

WATER QUALITY-

The quality of water for each system will not change. The water sampling shows both water sources (which are from the same aquifer) produce excellent tasting, safe, and clean drinking water. We currently sample each system monthly and will continue to sample the consolidated system monthly, in addition to our other routine samples mandated by the Department of Health.

SERVING NEW CUSTOMERS-

The mission of PUD 1 is to provide clean, safe and reliable water to all our customers, including ensuring that future developments have access to the same services. Currently, between the two systems there are 72 active connections out of 114 available connections. With the intertie of the water systems, we can increase capacity to 148 and be able to serve all properties within the water system, since there is currently more properties than available connections.




We believe that the fate of the Northwest's hydroelectric resources depends on

SCOPE & REACH

With our \$330,000 ad budget, our goal is to reach roughly 600,000 distinct audience members with 24 million content views, including over 9 million completed video views between 5/15/2020 - 8/9/2020.

ADDITIONAL FUNDING REQUEST

With an additional \$500,000, we could increase our total views by roughly 40% and increase our audience by 33%.

We recognize that your utilities are facing *extraordinary circumstances*. We only ask that you consider this request for additional funding among your priorities. We believe that we have the right strategy and message, but it will take sustained funding to change the trajectory of public opinion.

Dear Washington State Congressional Delegation,

Thank you for your leadership to confront the public health and economic crisis caused by COVID-19. We are grateful for your support of our communities amid this public health emergency. The need for safe, reliable water for drinking and sanitary services is particularly critical during this time. We are ensuring that every customer has access to safe, clean, reliable water during the pandemic.

However, the COVID-19 crisis has triggered declining revenues and increased costs for drinking water and wastewater, and a significant infusion of federal funding is needed to support utilities in their ongoing work to protect public health and the environment. As Congress works on the next phase of assistance for the coronavirus response, water and wastewater utilities across Washington state urge Congress to prioritize funding for utilities consistent with the following priorities:

Assistance for Low-Income Customers: With so many Washington residents and businesses suffering unprecedented economic hardship because of the coronavirus outbreak, more utility customers are finding it hard to pay their bills, yet access to clean water for hand washing and sanitation is critical to stop the spread of COVID-19. We request federal assistance to help utilities maintain services to low-income and struggling households during the pandemic.

Federal Assistance to Help Mitigate Lost Utility Revenues: We need access to federal funds to maintain utility operations that are affordable to customers. Across the nation, water utilities are estimated to see revenue reductions and cost increases of up to \$14 billion, which is nearly a 17-percent average direct impact on utility budgets; and public clean water agencies will face a \$12.5 billion loss of revenue due to COVID-19. Water utilities of all sizes in the state are struggling, with the possibility of smaller, rural water systems failing entirely. We request funding to utilities to help with costs related to water service disconnections, reconnections of delinquent accounts, customer bill assistance programs, and the impact of business shutdowns during the pandemic.

Capital Project Funding: We urge Congress to provide targeted grants and forgivable loans, through EPA's Drinking Water and Clean Water State Revolving Funds, to help utilities and municipalities rehabilitate or replace aging water and wastewater infrastructure.

Unlike transportation, the water and wastewater sectors have limited federal grant sources and rely on ratepayers who pay 80 to 90 percent of the costs. Water and wastewater utilities must continue providing these essential services despite the financial challenges utilities are incurring due to falling revenue from declines in usage from commercial and industrial users, maintaining service to delinquent ratepayers who cannot afford their bills, and moving forward whenever possible with near-term critical infrastructure projects. Funding water infrastructure projects is a smart and sustainable way to help keep rates affordable, construct needed capital projects, bolster the nation's economic recovery, and create and sustain well-paying jobs.

On behalf of Washington's water and wastewater utilities and the residents we serve, we thank you for your consideration of our requests and appreciate all you are doing to help Washingtonians and others in our nation during these challenging times.
